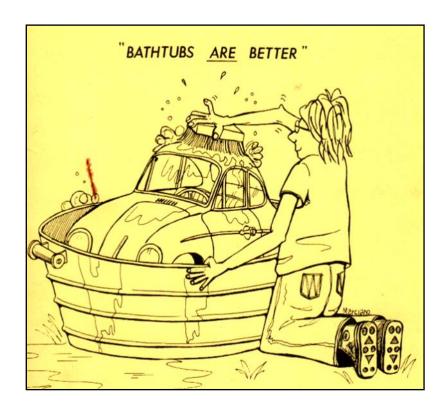

The address is 11 Badgers Island West, Kittery ME 03904.

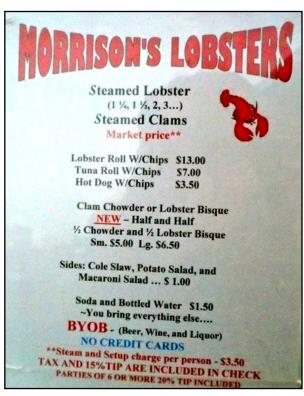
Donna will have the usual menu ready for us, but I must let her know ahead if you want a lobster roll (She needs time to cook and pick ahead).

Chip Bechtold

I was raised in Kingston, RI near URI. I am retired now from a career in international corporate insurance, working for insurers and a large insurance broking



firm based in NYC. I lived mostly in Wilton CT, commuting to the city daily. But I also worked in Europe for a dozen years living in London and Milan. My work, mostly for multinational clients, has taken me all over the world.

But, in my spare time, I have usually had a 356 to work on at home in our garage. I don't really know what has attracted me to these funny little cars. My first memory, probably in the late '50s, was of a red 356 coupe owned by a URI



coach. I bought an ivory colored '60 Super 90 coupe after graduation from UVM in '65 when I got my first job in Providence and would

drive up to Burlington weekends to see Marcia, now my wife. The interstates were just being finished then. No cops around late at night and the roads were wide open. What fun driving. Later I had an A cab which I painted silver – just like Sooter's.

In 1977 I bought a '59 Convertible D, originally ruby red. It was a real basket case with a torn top, broken windshield, heavy ding on the right front fender, holy floor pan and rockers, moldy interior, crapy paint,



etc. I had just restored our two car garage with workshop in anticipation and put the D into the workshop side, tore it apart, farmed out the engine and transmission for rebuilding and later had the body towed to a local body shop to be finished and sprayed. I had a long list of parts needed and started visiting swap meets and ordering from Tweeks, Stoddard and several others. Sometime along the way I had joined the Registry – as an early member – whose members were of great help. There was no local club at the time but a few 356 fans also helped.

Meanwhile I was doing a lot of travelling for business. Along the way, I was transferred to Milan for six years; the car was about ¾ finished. I walled in the car on the workshop side so tenants couldn't get at it. The year we came home was a busy one and then I was transferred to

London to do a startup. When I finally got back to the D, I had been 10 years away from it. Marcia suggested that I get some professional help – was she referring to me or the car? After researching I got Automobile Associates, Canton, CT to take over and finish the job. After owning the D for 28 years, I sold it

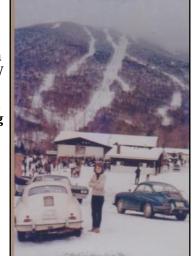
in 2005 following a final drive to the Holiday in Williamsburg together with the DiCorpos, Merrifields and Bill Sooter. I was happy with the sale then but as you know it was for a pittance at today's values.

Other cars during my travels: an Austin Healy 3000, Mk 3 in London. In Milan I met an American car designer who owned a body shop and reimported BMW CSis, mostly made for the American market, to Milan where he restored them and resold them to Europeans where they were highly valued. Tom sold me a '73 911 RS lightweight, a car that has had fantastic success. He was rebuilding it for me when I transferred home so I sold it to a Swedish firm wanting to build a racecar. In Milan, I also had an '83 Targa.

Out here on the Cape, I have a '97 993 911 coupe tucked away. My daily driver is a 2012 BMW M3.

I love all of the cars that I've owned but the 356 is my indisputable favorite. Chip Bechtold, Orleans, MA.

I bought this car from a Porsche 356 registry member over the phone sight unseen in 2002. He had it less than a year, as he had just bought it from its long term owner. I do not know the first owner but the



second was a Mr. McCullar, a Texas Methodist preacher who drove it from 1957-2002. He collected various VWs and Por-

sches but this was the car he used daily. I was able to talk with his wife several times about their experiences and fond memories. He had Al Zim repaint the



car in 1981 and do some engine rebuilding. The car was originally Pearl Grey with red interior. This probably meant the dash was red as well. Zim painted the entire car off the red



color of the dash, I believe. This is the same paint the car wears now. Also, the original engine was mistakenly switched with a 1958 engine and it was placed in an employee's 356. I was able to

track down that engine and I bought it in 2015 from a Mr. Butcher in Texas.

The car has been a staple of Porsche 356 Holidays thru the years winning its class at the Mystic CT. and Asheville NC. holidays. It has placed at the Fontana NC and most recently



at the 2016 Akron OH holidays, attesting to its longevity. My wife, Susan, and I have enjoyed driving it in many Carolina Trophy TSD

rallies, winning our class one year. We had just gotten married, and, despite several heated rally discussions, our marriage stayed intact!! It is equipped with a Halda Speedpilot, 1955 Heuer Autavia stopwatch, and an electronic timer for rallies.

One highlight was a several day drive with Susan's mother down the Blue Ridge Parkway in an Ultimate 356 Driving Tour. She often commented, in her beautiful English accent, on my driving, saying, "are we driving in a Ferrari!!". We drove in one of the recent TYP356ne spring tours to Saratoga Springs and I often enjoy a scenic 30 mile round trip to the NC mountains. This year I displayed her at the inaugural East Coast Porsche Werks Reunion and am registered for the September 2017 Porsche Treffen being held in Asheville NC. Lots of twisty, old

013 Forward Progress by P J Bernard

After so many years 013 has turned a corner. Up to this point it was shuffle from state to state and dream about how things should go. Then a couple of years of planning and finding a shop with experience and close enough to visit often. Finally in the shop, pulling, grinding and cutting all the offending bits off. Then straightening what was left and cleaning up the edges just to start moving forward. What an undertaking!!!!

When the car was purchased although damaged I highly doubt my father in law had any idea of how many years it would take to get to this stage. At that time as a GM engineer he could easily see himself digging in during those spare weekends not filled with heading to the track – then he had children.

In 1963 the car changed hands for \$175.00. Values have skyrocketed but then again the cost to restore a 356 has skyrocketed as well. How much is too much and where does one draw the line between saving and scrapping? While trying to be reasonable I've never been one for looking at it purely from a financial

view. Although I can attribute much of that from my mother's love of history which I have indeed inherited I'm pretty sure the deciding factor was working in a couple of junkyards while in college. This was around 1977 to 1980 when the cool cars showing up were from the mid 50's, late 60's and in the eyes of my boss they all looked like potential tuna tins. My heart skips a beat when thinking of the days spent dropping a giant cement block on intact Chevelle convertibles and Ford Victoria's so they'd pack and stack on the trailer. At that time European cars were still mostly bought by oddballs from the city and weren't even around long enough to get stripped. A couple of us young enough to have unrealistic dreams would frequently stash something we liked deep in the woods and quickly crowd as many good parts cars around them as possible. A sideways glance by the boss made clear it was obvious what was going on however my belief is nothing was said because he knew who won in the end. (I'm sure I was the only student driving a 1965 two door Biscuit with a leather interior from a Caddy. Armrests front and rear AND six way power adjustment! Factory fit, thanks Hollander.)

2013—Fifty years!

Since 013 was paid for, complete for the most part and a large pile of parts acquired from a 64 C I bought for \$500 our original investment is slim. A 1965 912 doubled the parts stash and will provide the engine so I can pickle the matching number and well running original (the 912 shell is complete with no damage

and probably should be resurrected). All in all this puts us in the position of being able to look at our restoration outlay as being reasonable given the value of fully restored cars. If we plan carefully the next few years and can keep the drivetrain rebuild and interior within normal estimates we'll be able to equal our cost to value, not easily done when speaking Porsche.

Welding not cutting!!!!!!!

I can end with a shot taken just two weeks ago at Ricks shop during the TYP356ne visit. We've rounded the corner and the inner nose is welded on, what a feeling!

I'll just add couple of apparent coincidences. The restoration work began in 2013 when I was 58, the vin is 58013. The previous owner was married on August 24, 1964 with his engagement probably being accepted not long after he got the sports car bug out of his system and the car sold to my father in law.

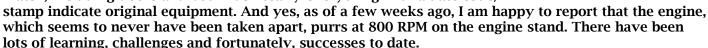

Carl Luck's Tub is back on track after a 17 year restoration hiatus

I am happy to report to my fellow members that after taking my 59 356A apart 17 years ago, and thanks to having recently retired, I have started the final stage of restoration, reassembly. I am hoping to be driving it to our sessions next year.

It all started when I purchased this tub here in Groton, MA. It was literally a barn find, as documented in the photo of my son where we picked it up in 1998. He is now 33 years old! The last owner's father bought it from their neighbor's wife 3 years after her husband, the original owner, passed, in ~1969. It hasn't seen the road since then with a mere 50,000 miles on it. It had the floors replaced and some of the usual rust spots worked on pre-69, but showed no signs of ever being hit or having major work. All numbers match, including doors and both lids. Nearly everything with a date code/





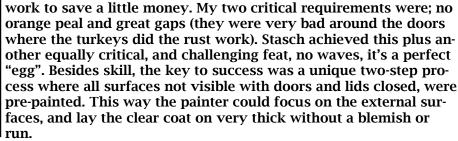
Before my hiatus I had someone do some body work and prime it and thought I was basically ready for paint. I couldn't have been more wrong. When I was lucky enough to have "Stasch" take a look at it (a friend of a friend, who had recently retired from being the head of the auto body department at our local vocational high school, Monochusets Regional Technical High

school) he pointed out all the reasons I was very, not ready for paint, and thank the Porsche Gods he was willing to take the project on. Long story short, about six months later, this

May, I got it back from paint and it far exceeded my expectations. It's as perfect as can be hoped for, and I am a bit fussy. The great thing about Stasch is he is still a teacher at heart







I would be happy to share any of my experiences and lessons learned with fellow enthusiasts. There is a lot to these very simple machines, but I am having a ball. 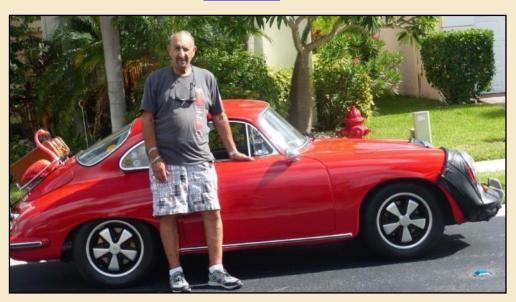
